


Implementing Effective Calendar Systems for Students with Combined Vision and Hearing Loss and Multiple Disabilities

Overall goal: Increase knowledge and implementation of calendar systems for students with deafblindness and multiple disabilities.

Overview:

We all use many kinds of “time pieces” (e.g., clocks and calendars)—also known as “time tools”—to keep us on track and oriented in the world. Time pieces are extremely important for students who have combined hearing and vision loss. The use of calendars is a key educational strategy for students with combined hearing and vision loss. Calendars help a student learn time concepts and time vocabulary, provide a way for her to understand and have some control over his/her schedule, and support conversations about everyday life activities.
