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



Vision-Specific Technology Enhances Student Learning



Students with low vision look forward to SMART Board lessons that are interactive and provide a variety of stimuli.



Elementary teacher Chris Klevorn uses the SMART Board for vocabulary, sight words, math concepts and communication arts and can adjust the size, color and contrast to meet students' visual needs.

During the summer of 2011, Missouri School for the Blind renovated its computer lab and upgraded its "vision specific" technology. In addition to a complete renovation of the computer lab, MSB upgraded all computers in the lab and moved older computers to classrooms. MSB also purchased "state-of-the-art" software and equipment for use by students individually and in the lab and classrooms.

OAITSD (Office of Administration Information Technology Service Division, State of Missouri) also enabled MSB to establish a separate student network and domain. All improvements were made to increase visually impaired students' ability to read, write and access data and to give teachers more options to differentiate instruction based on individual students' needs.

This project was made possible by support from Missouri Lions clubs and benevolent contributions to the Blind Trust Fund.

Outreach Programs Serve Families and Educators

The MSB Outreach Services Division is based in St. Louis and provides programs and resources to families and educators throughout the state. Outreach also offers numerous <u>professional development</u> opportunities throughout the year. The division is coordinated by <u>Jennie Mascheck</u>, a certified teacher of the visually impaired, who holds a masters degree in blind rehabilitation and orientation and mobility, and has more than 30 years' experience in the education of blind and visually-impaired students.

Another of Outreach's services is the <u>Missouri Deafblind Technical Assistance</u> <u>Project</u>, which provides technical assistance and support services to state and local educational agencies, private programs, adult service providers and families of individuals who are deafblind, ages birth

through 21. Project coordinator is Susan Bonner, who has a masters degree in special education and 35 years' experience as an educator.

Outreach also operates <u>The Missouri Statewide Parent</u> <u>Involvement Network (MoSPIN)</u>, which offers direct inhome services to families of children, age birth to five years, who are visually impaired and who may also have

other disabilities. Services include parent training and regularly-scheduled home visits. <u>Ginny Williams</u>, the Lead Parent Advisor who coordinates the program, holds numerous teaching certifications and has been an educator since 1969.

Also housed at MSB is the Missouri Instructional Resource Center (MIRC), which coordinates the registration of students who are legally blind and manages Federal Quota funds providing textbooks in Braille, large type and specialized educational materials for all Missouri legally blind students. The MIRC is supervised by <u>Yvonne Ali</u>, who has more than 30 years' experience in library and data services.

<u>The Missouri School for the Blind Library</u> <u>Media Center</u> loans books and other materials to professionals who work with students who are visually impaired, as well as braille books for students throughout Missouri. Teachers can access the <u>Professional Development Lending Library</u>, get <u>Advice on Selecting Books</u> and <u>Share</u> <u>Unused Braille Books</u>. Librarian <u>Mary</u> <u>Dingus</u> has been a certified teacher and librarian since 1980.


Here is a summary of MSB's technology project:

- 2 SMART Board interactive whiteboard systems, one installed in an elementary classroom and the other in the new technology classroom. The SMART board engages students with multiple learning styles and incorporates visual, tactile and auditory learning. It also incorporates educational software and SMART Response interactive wireless remotes.
- **10 64-bit HP computers** equipped with Windows 7 and 22" flat-screen monitors.
- **8 portable refreshable Braille displays** that enable users to read in Braille what is on the computer screen.
- **8 PEARLs** that convert text to speech or Word documents; maker Freedom Scientific calls them "portable reading solutions."
- **8 BrailleNotes** with speech and refreshable Braille display plus numerous applications recorder, book reader, word processor, internet access and navigation.
- **10 multi-positional desks** that can be raised or lowered or swung right or left to accommodate students of different sizes or those using wheelchairs or braces.



MSB Track Stars Take Second at Conference

MSB's track team took second place against nine other schools at the North Central Association of Schools for the Blind (NCASB) conference track and field meet at Tennessee the weekend of Sept. 30. MSB scored a total of 249 points, coming in behind Tennessee's 323, and ahead of Arkansas (224) and Indiana (198).

MSB's girls scored 142 points, just four less than conference-winner Arkansas. Individual gold medalists were: Tabitha Jenkins, 1600 yard run; and Amanda Drake, long jump; silver medalists: Meghan Chirchirillo, shotput; Amanda Drake, 1600

yard run; Kathryn Hurd, 600 yard run and 1200 yard tandem; Emily Pope and Carolyn McGhee, 4x200 relay; bronze winners: Jill McBroom, 800 yard run; Amanda Drake, shotput; Tabitha Jenkins, Alex Richardson, 1600 yard run; Carolyn McGhee, long jump, and Emily Pope, shotput.

Missouri's boys team scored 107 points, coming in third behind Tennessee and Indiana. Gold medalists: Trevon Graves, shotput and high jump, and DeVaughn Smith, long jump and 60 yard dash. Silver medals were won by Trevon Graves, Michael Babusa, 1600 yard run; Brynn Haines, 600 yard run and 1200 yard tandem, and DeVaughn Smith, triple jump. Michael Babusa took bronze in the 600 yard run.
