CONGRATULATIONS CLASS OF 2013!

On Wednesday, May 29, MSB staff, family and friends proudly watched the processional of the Class of 2013 into the Samuel L. Green Auditorium. Dr. Susan Fitzpatrick, who retired from MSB at the end of the 2011-2012 school year, was the commencement speaker for the evening and offered the students hope, inspiration, encouragement and humor in her address. The five members of this year's graduating class have a variety of experiences, but all have worked incredibly hard to get here. In this article, we will take a look at each graduate and the path they have taken to get to where they are today.



Tabitha Jenkins is the Valedictorian of the Class of 2013. Tabitha has worked very hard to earn that honor in the 5 years she has attended

MSB. While she excels in many of her subject areas, her favorite classes are Spanish, Braille, Math, English and Science – all of them actually! She admits that sometimes the work can

be frustrating, but she still enjoys her classes.

Tabitha is also an outstanding athlete. Extracurricular activities are something she says she missed out on while attending her previous school. When Tabitha started at MSB in 2008, she joined every sport and club that she could. She loves playing goalball and is sad about the possibility of not having the opportunity to play in college. Tabitha was also a critical member of both the track and swimming teams this past year - the teams took home the conference championship in both of those sports for the first time since the 1980s. She was also one of three girls on the wrestling team this year.

Besides athletics, Tabitha has also participated in the Library Cat Club, the High School Book Club, Braille Readers are Leaders, the Braille Challenge and Tech-It-Up a Notch. Tabitha says besides the opportunity and encouragement to participate in extracurriculars, her favorite thing about MSB is the available technology. In addition to Braille technology, MSB offers a

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wide variety of text-to-speech technology as well as equipment and software to increase size and contrast in type for those with low vision.

Outside of school, Tabitha enjoys reading, writing poetry, listening to music and exercising. This summer will be a busy one for Tabitha as she will be attending the Youth Leadership Academy held at the University of Missouri – Columbia, as well as the National Beta Convention in Mobile, AL.

Tabitha will return to MSB in the fall to participate in the LIFE Independent Learning Program with duel enrollment at St. Louis Community College at Forest Park.



Alyssa Henson is the 2013 Salutatorian. Alyssa came to MSB at the end of last September, when she was 17. Although she was mainstreamed when she lived in Illinois, she wanted to come to MSB when her family moved to Missouri

because of the residential program offered. Her IEP team agreed that with college in her near future, the experience of living away from home would be beneficial for Alyssa. She was also very interested in the Orientation and Mobility instruction, as well as instruction in Activities of Daily Living (ADL) offered at MSB. Although she had received lessons in Orientation and Mobility at her previous school, she wanted the experience of navigating an urban setting and the opportunity to familiarize herself with public transportation. Her IEP team agreed that this setting would be beneficial to prepare for her transition into college.

Alyssa didn't have many athletic opportunities at her previous school, so when she came to MSB, she jumped in with both feet – literally! Alyssa was a member of the girls' 2012-13 swim team which won first place in the NCASB conference! Alyssa's other extracurriculars included the goalball team and the high school reading club.

While Alyssa's time at MSB may be shorter than some of her peers, she packed in as much experience as possible. Alyssa says she will mostly miss the friends she has made and her MSB teachers.

This summer will be a busy one for Alyssa. The things she is looking forward to most are receiving a guide dog and beginning school at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. Alyssa hopes to be a teacher of the visually impaired (TVI) and NIU has a strong program. When she visited, she was also impressed with their accessibility resource center.

In addition to preparing for college, Alyssa will be traveling to Los Angeles, CA to compete in the National Braille Challenge. Alyssa scored higher than thousands of other students across the country to become one of the top 60 finalists in the National Braille Challenge. After competing at the National Braille Challenge, Alyssa will travel to Rochester Hills, MI to attend three weeks of instruction at Leader Dogs for the Blind. Alyssa has enjoyed the opportunity of getting to work with Susie, the guide dog of MSB teacher Patti Schonlau. Susie was trained by Leader Dogs for the Blind, so Alyssa is excited to have a head start in the program.



Cortez Dillworth came to MSB when he was just 5 years old. Cortez is excited about what his future holds, but hasn't quite decided on what he wants to pursue next. His favorite thing to do when he is at home is listening to the Ricky

Smiley morning show on the radio. His favorite things about MSB are the classes he took while enrolled in the LIFE (Learning Independence From Experience) program, as well as the group time he got to spend with Ms. Campbell, the guidance counselor. Cortez says he is going to miss riding the yellow bus, his friends and "Miss Carla," one of his LIFE instructors.



Jesse Hicks came to MSB when he was 18 to study in the LIFE program. He says that his favorite class at MSB was mobility and outside of class, he enjoyed his time participating in the Library Cat Club, the Horticulture Club and intra-

mural sports. At home, Jesse enjoys playing games and music on the computer, watching TV and going to swimming lessons. Jesse has been officially hired by the Boone Center workshop and is anxiously awaiting his start date. Jesse says he will miss his teachers and fellow classmates at MSB the most.



Samantha Torres came to MSB when she was 18 years old also to study in the LIFE program. After being home schooled for 11 years, Samantha has enjoyed learning various activities of daily living skills, including cook-

ing for herself and learning to do laundry. Sam also says she is going to miss her friends and the staff of MSB the most, but is looking forward to being home more often and starting life on her own. She hopes to get a job in a local workshop after graduation.

The motto the Cass of 2013 chose is "Continuing to reach for the stars." When Mr. Don Gerard, president of the MSB Advisory Board, presented diplomas to the students, he said it was clear that each and every one of them intended to continue striving to reach their greatest potential. We are very proud of all of our graduates and wish them the best of luck in their future endeavors!

TORNADO RELIEF


